5th November- Bonfire Night/ Guy Fawkes

Guy Fawkes Night, or Bonfire Night, is an annual event held on the 5th November every year. It commemorates the discovery of the Gunpowder plot in 1605.

Do you know the 5th November 'Remember, Remember' rhyme? Penned in 1626 by John Milton, the first stanza is often used as a refrain on Guy Fawkes Night. Written while Milton was a student at Cambridge University, the poem was originally written in Latin and titled 'In Quintum Novembris' ('On the Fifth of November') The first stanza is as follows:

Remember, remember the fifth of November, Gunpowder treason and plot. I see no reason why gunpowder treason Should ever be forgot!
